Our new Commodore is **Andrew Lansdale** [1960-62] on leaving the ship he joined BI, served his time and then joined China Navigation, he then proceed to tour the globe so to speak sitting his tickets. Mates in Sydney and Masters in Hong Kong. He came ashore to become a Ship Broker in London, then Tokyo and Hong Kong and it was this experience which doubtless held when turn to professional journalism as Markets Editor with Fairplay. He became Journalist of the Year in 2007 before going freelance in 2009.

He still works full time reviewing and editing Admiralty Seamanship and Navigation Manuals as well as Casualty Management Guidelines.

Andrew says he is overweight, unfit and only sails when the seas are calm and the winds light. With all that writing experience why then I ask, did I volunteer to write this newsletter?

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Andrews's deputy as Vice Commodore is **Bob Lineker** who left the ship 1968 as one of the very last real Old Worcesters,. He first joined Port Line and served on MANZ and CRUSADER runs and so never left or returned to the UK by sea again. He joined the RN in 1972 going to university to gain a degree in electrical engineering. On graduation he volunteered as a submariner serving on "O" class boats before being selected to specialise in Strategic [Nuclear] Weapon Systems and then joining HMS Repulse as Senior Weapons Engineer.

He later went to the US for three years in Washington as the UK representative with the Special Projects team procuring the Trident Weapons System. He went on the head the RN Strategic Weapons School and was responsible with Flag Officer Training for the certification of Trident equipped submarine crews. He left the RN a Commander in 2004 as Head of the Strategic System Patrol Analysis Group to live in Pembrokeshire, still training but this time with the National Coast Watch Institution.

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The Rear Commodore is **Trevor Crawford** who left the ship in July 1963 as CC Main Division. He served with Port Line from cadet to Second Mate but in 1969 he joined Esso Tankers to Chief Officer serving in large coasters and up to VLCC until 1974. Trevor gained his Masters in 1973 and moved to Canadian Pacific as Chief Officer in 1975

He served as Master with various foreign flag and offshore companies between 1976 and 1988. Then followed 18 years as rig mover and marine co-ordinator with Saudi Arabian Oil Co (ARAMCO).1988 to 2006. Retired from Aramco in 2006 then employed as consultant/rigmover with Noble Denton Associates until 2010. Trevor's last job was as Marine Manager for a French/Saudi survey company (ARGAS) managing a fleet of 20 seismic survey vessels. He finally retired 2013. (Whew!)

Our Hon Sec is **Peter Gormley**. He left the ship in 1957 and joined Cunard in its Purser's Department. After four years, he left them to study in Paris. In 1968 he joined the brewery group Bass Charrington where he stayed for more than 20 years. In 1988 he set up his own company specialising in property management in London. He retired in 2007 and splits his time between North London and West Wittering.

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The AGM Summary.

Twenty five members attend at the Farmers Club accompanied by their ladies who were in for a slightly longer chat than they had anticipated. The AGM lasted longer than usual. Apologies were received from some 30 members and the usual formalities completed with the bonus that no members had crossed the bar this year.

It was time for the outgoing commodores report.Ian Ward summed up the past year explaining that with the tragedy of David Marsden's sudden illness and death preventing him from becoming Commodore in 2013, it was however felt that the club should continue with David's plans for a Rendezvous at the Royal Southern Yacht Club. So 41 members and 10 boats joined the gathering and Ian completed his report by stating that *"The whole rendezvous was a great success, although I feel we need to concentrate on improving club attendance."*

Ian stressed that nearly 70% of our members are either Life Members or over 75, who under the Club's Constitution are Senior Members with no further liability for subscriptions.

The remaining members pay just £4 a year. A few members already make a voluntary contribution by standing order, which range between £10 and £25 a year and Ian asked if others would also like to do so.

Ian was on his feet again to deliver the Treasurer's report, saying that although the accounts apparently show a deficit of \pounds 4115.81 for the year. However, Ian pointed out that this deficit included the purchase of \pounds 5000 in Premium bonds and when this is taken into account the working deficit is \pounds 1379.19, much of which arises from the losses at the summer rendezvous.

Before the officers were elected as above, the new Rear Commodore was asked to outline his provisional plan for the 2016 Rendezvous to be held at a venue on the Thames at or near Gallion's Reach. This was favourably received by the members present, in particular those on the East Coast !
